I'd thought I'd do something a little different from my usual, *Notes from the Editor* column.

Veggie Smoothies for Roses

Ahhh...the lazy days of summer are almost over. September is an excellent time to remove spent blooms and feed your roses a nutritional, cool-down snack. You'll

want to avoid overdoing the nitrogen (the 1<sup>st</sup> number) this time of the year. Pick a fertilizer with a higher Phosphorus count (2<sup>nd</sup> number). I know, I know, too much Phosphorus will bind up other essential nutrients in the soil. For our environments sake, please don't overuse <u>any</u> fertilizer. As my Mother-in-Law always says, "Everything in moderation my dear!"

This fall, I will treat my roses to veggie smoothies. All my peelings, eggshells and coffee grounds are now being put to use. I keep them in a baggie until the baggie is full, then I put my collection into a blender and pour the soupy mixture into a bucket. I have been storing my compost bucket in our refrigerator. When my bucket is full, hopefully by the first of September, I will set it outside for a few days. Inside the mixture, I will add a few of my personal favorites: 2 cups of Epsom salts, a few splashes (like 1/2 quart) of liquid Medina and "Bam!" throw in minced garlic cloves. After my slop steeps for a few days, I will give each rose 1-2 cups worth. I plan on pouring my mixture under the mulch, so I won't encourage the night roaming creatures, I'd rather not know about! Not only will your roses enjoy this satisfying snack, but it'll keep your earthworms healthy too!

With an adequate amount of water, along with a good feeding, your roses should bloom well into December. Even though some roses will bloom throughout the winter, it is important not to encourage it with overfeeding. Old Blush is usually one I can't keep quiet during the winter. She is loud and proud. Although, most roses require a dormant period, this doesn't ring true for many of the antiques. As long as the plant remains healthy, I let it do as it pleases. Within reason, that is.

## When to Bring your Toddler au Natural into the Garden with You

No, this is not about potty training - it's about the <u>Old Farmer's Almanac</u>. (OFA afficionados know where I'm going with this, don't you?) If you aren't acquainted with the

Old Farmer's Almanac, though, hie thee to a bookstore or get it online. It's a treasure.

I first discovered the OFA in 1990 when a Rustler passed me an extra one she had lying around. At the time I wasn't working outside the home and when my baby and toddler were down for naps, I'd go out into the garden and try some fun experiments. I missed the research work I did at John Sealy Hospital, prebaby, and so busied myself labeling little pots instead of test tubes. I compared RootTone vs. Dipn'Grow – the latter was the better. I tried various potting soil types with varying degrees of success. And I tried to root some cuttings by the moon vs. at non-ideal moon times, using my OFA. The cuttings planted by the moon actually did do somewhat better. pleasantly surprised!

But did you know the Old Farmer's Almanac is also handy for telling you when to start that diet you keep meaning to get to (Sept.2, 11 and Oct. 8-9)? Or trim your split ends to encourage hair growth (Sept. 15-16 and Oct. 23-24)? Or do you have hair that grows too fast? Then you need to cut your hair on hair-growth-discouraging days (Sept. 3-4 and Oct. 1-2, 13). Have you been happily nursing that precious baby for months but are now beginning to see bottles and bowls of rice cereal in whole new light? There's even a best time to wean (Sept. 2, 11 and Oct. 8-9).

Which brings me back to the toddler. I used to bring my potty-training age kids into the garden with me, sans diaper, just slightly before they were ready for true training. I wanted them to make the connection between the wet diaper and where it came from. The look on the face of a toddler who suddenly

comes into that *so-THAT's-how-that-happens!* realization is a true Kodak moment. I didn't know it at the time, but there is also a best phase of the moon to potty-train by (Sept. 2, 11 and Oct. 8-9).

It's too late for me now – that toddler will be off to college in a year – but if you have potty-training in your future, or camping, pollinating, harvesting, baling hay, quitting smoking, or a myriad of other events, consider consulting the Old Farmer's Almanac first. ## Sweetheart Rose, Sweet Brier Rose

Both of the names, Sweetheart Rose and Sweet Brier Rose, are nicknames that have been given to two different roses. Sometimes, however, the names have been mixed up, but only in name. There is no resemblance between these two roses. They are entirely different in every way. The proper name for Sweet Brier Rose is Rosa Eglanteria. It is an old native English rose. It is even mentioned in some of Shakespeare's writings. amazing to me, and I have it growing here at Serenity Pond. It really has been struggling the last few years due to our severe drought. This year, was my year of "the flood", so it has bounced back some. At one time, it had gotten very large, and then during the severe drought, it went down to almost nothing. concerned it would perish this year. Then the rains came! It is not as large as it once was, but it is growing. This part of Texas is not known to be a good location for the old European roses. Even at its largest growth here, it did not sucker. It is located next to Calocarpa, a Rugosa, which does sucker. Both Calocarpa and R. Eglanteria have single pink blooms in the spring followed by large rose hips; both have very healthy thorns and are very large. R. Eglanteria is known more for the apple scent of the leaves. Since I am interested in History, I am most anxious to have this rose growing here at Serenity Pond. I think I should have put it

where it would get a break from the hot summer afternoon sun. The good news is that it is growing.

Sweetheart Rose is the nickname for Cecil Brunner. This is a Polyantha and is known for the small perfectly shaped buds. The buds were once popular to be used in corsages for the ladies and the lapels for the The climbing sport of this rose is men. commonly grown in Australia, a long time favorite there. Since it can tolerate some shade, I had a lovely Climbing Cecil Brunner growing up into a tree. It got very large; the buds and blooms were a thrill from spring through fall. Then the tree grew to be huge. The tree is lovely but the result is that the shade became too dense, plus the roots robbed the rose of moisture. I had to relocate it. I am pleased that it seems to be doing well in the new location. The shrub of Cecil Brunner is one of my son, Perry's, favorites. I have never seen a lovelier bush than what he grew along the side of his house near Houston, on the Brazos River. He loved that rose and everyone commented on it. His family increased so he had to move to a larger house and it was requested he not take the rose with him. I think the trick was that his Cecil Brunner was located where it did not get the hot afternoon sun. Perry's rose got sun most of the day, but during the hottest hours of the day and in the hottest time of summer, his Cecil Brunner was shaded. Though this rose is not known for its fragrance, it does have a faint pleasing fragrance. This is a good garden rose for the beginner to the experienced.

## **GIVE AND TAKE**



## 1990 Constitution and Bylaws of the Texas Rose Rustlers Articles V-VI

#### ARTICLE V

Officers

## Section 1. OFFICERS

The officers of this organization shall consist of a Chairman, a Program Chairman, a Chairman/Editor of *The Old Texas Rose* newsletter, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Chairman of the Rustle.

## ARTICLE V,

## Section 2. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

- A. A Nominating Committee shall consist of a chairman appointed by the current Chairman of The Texas Rose Rustlers, and shall include two other members of the Rustlers chosen by the Chairman of the Nominating Committee, who are members in good standing and who are not currently serving as officers of the organization.
- B. The Nominating Committee shall furnish a list of candidates, recommended by the Committee who have indicated a willingness to serve, to the Chairman/Editor of the newsletter to be published in the newsletter prior to the fall gathering/rustle of The Texas Rose Rustlers.
- C. Nominations for office shall be permitted from the floor during the fall meeting. Those members nominating candidates shall check with their candidates prior to nominating them and shall determine their willingness to serve.
- D. Officers will be elected at the Annual Fall Meeting of evennumbered years, and shall serve for two full years beginning on the first day of January following the election.

E. In the event an officer cannot, does not, or will not act or continue to carry out the duties of the office, the Executive Board shall appoint a member to fill his/her unexpired term of office.

#### ARTICLE VI

Duties of Officers

#### Section 1. Chairman

- A. Shall preside at all meetings and serve as ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee.
- B. Shall, along with the Treasurer, be responsible for the finances of the organization.
- C. Shall appoint all necessary committee chairmen and shall appoint all committee vice-chairmen to assist any Chairman when deemed necessary, or when requested to do so by the Committee Chairman.
- D. Shall, together with the Program Chairman, approve of all proposed programs. In the unlikely event that the Chairman and the Program Chairman cannot agree on any aspect of a program proposed for a Texas Rose Rustle function, meeting, symposium, or Rustle, then the Editor shall have the decisive vote on the proposed program of aspect thereof.

## Section 2. Program Chairman

- A. Preside at all meetings in absence of the Chairman.
- B. Shall prepare and coordinate all Texas Rose Rustler Programs, subject to the approval of the Chairman.
- C. Shall have authority, subject to the joinder by the Chairman, to set dates for the Spring and Fall functions of The Texas Rose Rustlers; may move the date for the Spring function to a date in early Summer, or may move the date for the Fall function to a date

in mid to late Summer. In the event the Program Chairman and the Chairman cannot agree on dates for The Texas Rose Rustlers functions, then the Chairman/Editor shall have the decisive vote as provided in Article VI, Sect. 1, D.

Section 3. Chairman/Editor of The Old Texas Rose

- A. The Chairman/Editor shall see that the newsletter, *The Old Texas* Rose, is published and mailed once each Quarter to each member of The Texas Rose Rustlers, and to the publishers of related information sources with whom this organization exchanges publications.
- B. Shall have the deciding vote in all stalemates between the Chairman and the Program Chairman.

## Section 4. Secretary

- A. Shall write all correspondence in cooperation with the Chairman.
- B. Shall record the minutes of the Annual Fall Meeting.

#### Section 5. Treasurer

- A. Shall handle the funds of the organization in cooperation with the Chairman. Both the Treasurer and the Chairman shall be able to sign checks on the bank account of The Texas Rose Rustlers; there being at least two approved signatures on the bank signature card at all times to provide that one of the two officers are available for signing checks and for conducting the banking needs of The Texas Rose Rustlers. The fiscal year for this organization shall be January 1 through December 31.
- B. Shall deposit all funds received by The Texas Rose Rustlers or *The Old Texas Rose* into the organization's bank account and shall pay all bills presented for payment after approval by the Chairman. The Treasurer shall

maintain the financial records as set up, without changing the method unless the Treasurer shall propose a new method or methods to the Executive Board and the Board approves and adopts the new method or methods.

- C. Shall render any information required by the Internal Revenue Service relating to this organization.
- **D.** The Treasurer's books shall be audited annually by a Committee appointed by the Chairman.

### Section 6. Chairman of the Rustle

- A. Shall be charged with planning and organizing all Rustles, including site permissions.
- B. Shall obtain the approval of the plans for all Rustles from either the Chairman or the Program Chairman.

## Section 7. Executive Committee

- A. The Executive Committee of The Texas Rose Rustlers shall consist of the Chairman, the Program Chairman, the Chairman/Editor, the Secretary, and the Treasurer.
- B. The Executive Committee shall have the authority to act when a quorum of three (3) shall be present after notice of the Executive Board Meeting has been given to at least four (4) of the five Board Members. Voting shall be by simple majority.
- C. Shall appoint an officer to replace any officer who resigns, or who cannot or does not perform the acts charged to his/her office.


